Literacy	Encourage your child to read for at least 20 minutes, four
Reading: We will be exploring the features of a variety of texts – both fiction and non-fiction. The children will be reading in groups in Guided Reading sessions and will also be given time to read by themselves. The children should bring in their book bags every day and reading records will be checked once a week. Writing This term children will be taught to plan, draft, write, edit and evaluate their own writing. We will work on selecting appropriate grammar and vocabulary.	 Encourage your child to develop an interest in newspapers / magazines. Encourage your child to use the local library. Support your child in proof-reading (checking) their writing homework. Encourage your child to read newspapers Children will continue to have the opportunity to take books out of the class book corner. They should bring their book bags and reading books to school on a daily basis. Please remind your child to return their books and change them regularly. Please help your child practise spelling words as they arise in weekly homework. The 'Look, Say, Cover, Write and Check' method is particularly useful in learning to spelling words. There will be a spelling test on Thursday morning.
Maths	Help your child to learn their times tables and try to sit with
Recall 2, 5, 10, 3, 4 and 8x times tables. Fractions: Focus on adding and subtracting fractions. Looking at finding unit and non-unit fractions of amounts. To continue to consolidate other fractions knowledge. Geometry: Identify 2D/ 3D shapes; identify right angles in shapes and turns and compare angles that are less than or greater than right angles. Time: reading time to the nearest 5 and 1 minute. Consolidate understanding of days, months and years. Identify start and end time using a formal method. Money: identifying different coins, recognise pounds and pence. Look at adding values of money using formal methods. Using money in realistic word problems including finding change. Statistics: drawing and interpreting bar charts and pictograms. Using information found to answer questions.	your child while they do their homework. Ask them to show and explain the new methods they have been learning in school. Talk to your child about the time and reading the time. Discuss how long activities take using various units of time (seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, years). Science The children will be studying animals including humans making links to units of measurements and statistics.	Discuss events in the news which link with our studies in Science.
	Encourage the children to ask questions and help them to research their answers.
Computing Pupils will follow the Switched on Computing units: 'We are Bloggers': Pupils will become familiar with blogs as a medium and a genre of writing and create a sequence of blog posts on a theme. Discuss how the religions learnt about in class compare to other religions, including the child's own faith where relevant.
PE & Gross motor Outdoor – Tennis Indoor – Yoga	 Take your child to the park for running, sports and other healthy activities. Take your child swimming. Your child should bring their PE kit to school at the beginning of the week and take home on Friday.

Discuss the core value of kindness and how they can show this to others. Talk about your culture and what is important to your family
Learning Skills Thinking skills, creative thinking, problem solving and reasoning. Developing a sense of self worth and understanding of self and others.	 Encourage your child to complete their homework every week and assist them where necessary. Talk about themselves and their community.
French This term, the children will learn how to describe animals and how to talk about the weather.	Get your child to name some animals in French and describe the weather everyday using vocabulary learnt.

Additional Useful Information

- -Book bags are to be brought to school EVERY DAY. New books can be taken home every day but at least once a week. *Please ensure your child reads for approximately 20 minutes daily, sometimes independently and sometimes with an adult
- -Every week there will be homework: one piece of Literacy and one Numeracy exercise. It is handed out by --Thursday and is always due back the next Wednesday morning.
