

- Our curriculum INTENT will be added to our Parent curriculum information sheets.


4. Which subjects does your child enjoy learning?

We are pleased that the children enjoy learning wide range of subjects.


5. In order to support your child effectively, which subject(s) would you like the school to support you with?


- "A parents recap class would be good to help with homework. It's been years"
